Here are four things to know.

- Eligibility is based on income levels. For example, single people earning less than \$75,000 will receive \$1,200, and married couples filing jointly earning less than \$150,000 combined would receive a total of \$2,400. For info on eligiblity, visit the IRS website:

- Eligible individuals who filed a 2018 or 2019 tax return with a direct deposit authorization will receive their payments automatically from the IRS they do not need to take any action. Track payment status at: https://www.irs.gov/coronavi-rus/qet-my-payment
- For individuals who were not required to file a tax return in 2018 or 2019, a web portal is available to submit basic personal information to the IRS so that payments can be distributed. The portal is available at:

- Those who have no income, as well as those whose income comes from Social Security, Railroad Retirement, disability or veterans' benefits are entitled to a payment. Eligible retirees who receive either Social Security retirement or Railroad Retirement benefits will receive payments automatically.
